This month, our sisters at the shelter home were given brushes, paint, and a blank canvas. What they created was something none of us had words for.

Thirty paintings came to life in a single session. Each one was a window into a world of memory, longing, courage, and quiet, unbreakable hope.

Here are five voices from the canvases:

RANI'S Painting: A Voice Against Violence

She painted a girl standing tall with the words Stop Violence written above her. The girl is not simply standing still. She is speaking.

"We should speak up for ourselves and stand for other girls facing injustice."

She has seen what silence costs. She chose to paint the opposite.



ISHA'S Painting: The Road Back to the Classroom

She painted herself walking to school. For years, circumstances pulled her away from education before she was ready to leave it.

"Going to school has always been my dream. Now I study in Grade 5 and I really enjoy it."

She painted this walk because it means something words cannot quite hold. It means a future is possible.





MINA'S Painting: The Door She Still Waits At

She painted her home: mountains behind it, flowers she had planted herself. A girl sits at the door. That girl is her, imagining what life might look like if everything had been okay.

"I believe my mother is proud of me, even though she is not in this world."

Grief and gratitude, held together in one painting. She did not choose between them.

DEVI'S Painting: Freedom, Painted in Open Hands

She painted two open hands holding a butterfly and wrote one word beside it: Freedom. Before coming to the shelter home, she felt trapped, unable to find a way forward.

"After coming here, I feel free and happy. This place feels like home."

The butterfly is not decoration. It is the record of the moment her life turned. A transformation that lead her to unlimited power and courage.



MEERA & BINA'S Painting: Two Dreams, One Canvas

Both of them painted together: one a police officer, one a lawyer. Both figures are themselves. One wants to rescue girls in danger. The other wants to ensure those girls receive justice.

"Together, their painting reflects their shared dream of helping others and bringing positive change."

They have lived inside injustice. Now they are painting their way out of it. A shared dream to help other girls out of injustice.
